ive years ago—pre-Sugarland— Jennifer Nettles was sitting on her living room couch in Decatur, Ga., when Reba McEntire's "Whoever's in New England" grabbed her attention on the radio. "I was listening to it thinking, 'That's such a great song,' but in the end there are three people here in this equation," Jennifer explains. "And, many times, a song is from the perspective of the person who's been hurt, or the person who's been cheated on.

"I thought, wouldn't it be interesting to tell this story from the perspective of the other woman, because nobody tells that story. She's not happy in this situation, I would imagine."

That's when Jennifer did something she had never done before . . . she began writing a song. "I picked up my guitar and just started playing around," Jennifer recalls. "And the first line came—I been sittin' here starin' at the clock on the wall / And I been layin' here prayin,' prayin' she won't call-and the story just unfolded. By the end of the song, the woman has her own sense of redemption and realizes she deserves more than being with someone who will never be fully hers."

Sugarland, the duo of Jennifer and partner Kristian Bush, recorded "Stay" on their sophomore album, Enjoy the Ride, in 2006. In the video for the single—which hit the No. 2 spot on the Billboard chart-Jennifer performs a tearful rendition, which raises a question: Has she ever been the other woman in a relationship?

"You know what, I haven't," Jennifer is quick to point out. "However, considering what the statistics are, if you're sitting between two people and you look to your right and you look to your left, one or both of them has experienced this on some level.

"For me, the emotional connection I make with this song in its performance is that of understanding loss," adds Jennifer, who went through a divorce last year. "That is essentially what this song is about."

Jennifer, who generally writes songs with other songwriters, enjoys the feeling of solo accomplishment. "I love writing with Kristian," Jennifer admits, "and he is my favorite person to write with. At the same time, it's nice when one has inspiration and is able to put that down and people can relate to it. It feels encouraging and empowering."
